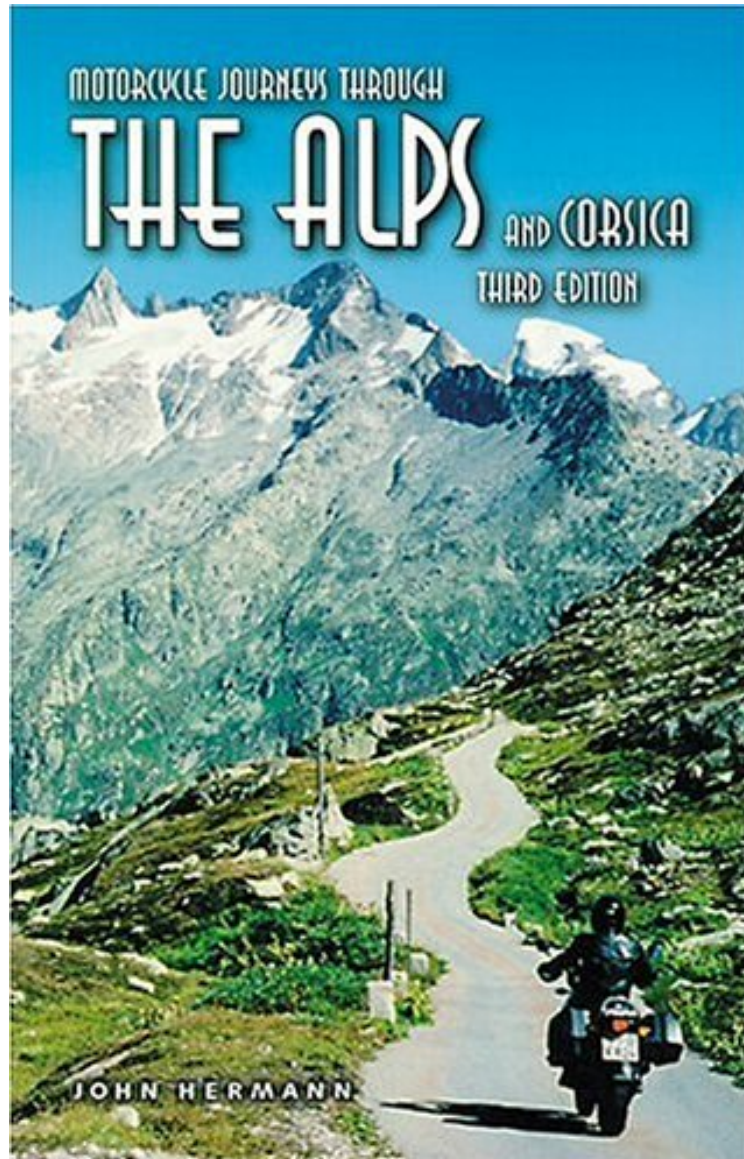


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## Motorcycle Journeys Through the Alps and Corsica

Use this and an internet translator site (like Babelfish) and you can make your reservations in some of the same hotels that Edelweiss and other formal tour groups use. This new edition expands on the first by adding Corsica and updating the Alps/Dolomite section. It is a great read. John is the recognized authority on this area for those of us that don't speak other languages well, and don't live there.
