This is so for a number of reasons. One is that it provides a decent overview of all the sites worthy of seeing in Vienna. Secondly, it provides a ranking of regions in Vienna so a user can

determine what sites to see depending on time available. Thirdly, good maps of regions in the city are provided for showing sites to see within regions as well as decent "walkabouts" within those regions (along with recommendations on what to see when walking). The book does have a few negatives though that prevent this reviewer from granting it a five-star rating. The most serious problem, like most National Geographic guides, is that there is no fold out map (or any other) that covers the full city. This makes it difficult to navigate from between the different regions of the city (for which the guide does have good maps for). Plus there is no map of the city's extensive subway system. Hence it is highly recommended purchasing a full map of the city to supplement this guide. As stated previously, there are regional maps of locations within the city, but without a full map it is impossible to navigate from one region to the next. A second problem, albeit minor in comparison to the map problem, is that the book is missing a number of minor details that are of some note. For example, the fact that nearly all museums (unlike those in the Anglo-Saxon nations) require more than trivial entrance fees (typical fees range from 15 – 20 Euros). These add up to quite a bit after a while. In short, despite these problems, a very good guide. Just be sure to purchase a decent map to supplement it.

This guide is very comprehensive, covers all the city districts, is and quite useful for a tourist going to Vienna who plans to stay anywhere from 3 days to 3 weeks. But, beware! The type is small and uses a very light typefont. Hard to read without a magnifier for those with older eyes. The book is also a bit heavy so if weight is a consideration, be warned. The walking tours and sidebars are great, but it is a bit light on places to eat, as though that is a problem in Vienna. The only problem is having your clothes still fit for the 'plane ride home. I suggest that you use this book to plan, in some detail, your stay in Vienna, use a scissors to take the relevant pages out for the trip and get a "Streetwise Vienna" street map to take along. And do not miss the Sacher Torte at the Hotel Sacher. And for goodness sakes, stop thinking about the Third Man theme!
